The philosophy of the LL.M. program is to offer students a broad platform to design their own course of study within parameters set by the MCL law faculty.

For international students, the program emphasizes exposure to U.S. law, a comparison of U.S. and other legal systems, and advanced legal theory and policy. Subject to criteria established by the State Bar of California, the LL.M. may qualify a foreign-educated graduate to sit for the California Bar Exam.

For **U.S. students**, the program provides an opportunity to utilize the resources of MCL to pursue advanced study in areas of specific interest. Within this framework, LL.M. students have considerable latitude in planning their course of study.

Master of Laws

Advanced law degrees serve as recognition of formal legal education beyond the J.D. degree. The LL.M. program offers students a broad platform to design their own course of study within parameters set by the MCL law faculty. Upon completion of the program, graduates will demonstrate mastery of three learning outcomes.

Vision & Mission

Monterey College of Law's mission is to provide a quality legal education in a community law school setting with graduates who are dedicated to professional excellence, integrity, and community service.

Applicants to the LL.M. Program must have received their first degree in law at either an American Bar Association (ABA) approved law school, a state-accredited law school, or at a law school approved by the appropriate authority in a country other than the United States.

In addition, MCL will consider any applicant, domestic or international, who is licensed to practice law and is currently in good standing in the jurisdiction in which they are licensed.

Graduation Requirements

The LL.M. degree requires the successful completion of 24 graduate law units, including a capstone thesis. In addition to the capstone thesis, LL.M. students may take doctrinal, skills, clinical, or elective courses.

Transfer credits will be allowed for certain graduate and law courses that meet MCL's academic standards. If approved, transfer credits may be applied towards up to one-half of the 24-unit graduation requirement.


Learning Outcomes

At Monterey College of Law, our institutional learning outcomes serve as the foundation for all academic programs, providing a cohesive framework that guides the development of program-specific learning outcomes. These institutional outcomes reflect our core mission to cultivate knowledge, skills, and ethical values that prepare students for meaningful contributions to the legal profession and society.

The program learning outcomes, whether for the Juris Doctor (JD), Master of Legal Studies (MLS), or Master of Laws (LL.M.) programs, are directly aligned with these overarching goals, translating them into specific competencies tailored to each program.

At the course level, Course Learning Outcomes (CLOs) are designed to reflect and support the PLOs of the respective programs. CLOs are aligned with PLOs through detailed curriculum mapping, ensuring that each course contributes to the development of skills and competencies outlined in the program-level outcomes. The alignment between ILOs, PLOs, and CLOs ensures a coherent and integrated learning experience across all programs. This systematic approach allows MCL to assess and enhance student achievement at every level, fostering continuous improvement and maintaining alignment with accreditation standards.





LL.M. PROGRAM Learning Outcome Assessment

The LL.M. program requires 24 graduate law credits, culminating in a capstone thesis. Alongside the thesis, students can tailor their studies by selecting from doctrinal, skills, clinical, and elective courses. Because the program is highly customizable, the chart below illustrates the typical assessment methods associated with each course category.
