Vision & Mission

Master of Legal Studies

MCL's Master of Legal Studies curriculum was designed to prepare students for professional non-lawyer careers. Students will graduate with an advanced knowledge of the law and the American legal system. After completing the two-year program, graduates will demonstrate mastery of three student learning outcomes.

On-Site and Online Cohorts

MLS students attend law courses that are part of the regular law school curriculum and are held to the same standards for attendance, participation, and grading as students in the JD and LL.M. programs.

Students in the MLS program must complete 36 units of graduate legal studies. A minimum of 18 units must be completed in residence. Students are allowed flexibility in selecting courses in order to provide the opportunity to focus on specific areas of legal interest.

Students must complete 29 units of required courses and 7 units of electives. Required Courses include Contracts (6 units), Torts (6 units), Criminal Law (3 units), Constitutional Law (6 units), Legal Research (2 units), Legal Writing I (2 units), Core Mediation training (2 units), and MLS Thesis (2 units).

Required Courses

Contracts I & II

Two sequential, 3-unit, one-semester classes. Six total units.

This class covers enforceable agreements including requirements for the formation of acontract; problems of interpretation, consideration and its equivalent; damages for breach; the statute of frauds; illegality, and rights and liabilities of third parties arising from the contract itself or from assignment of contractual rights or delegation of duties.

Torts I & II

Two sequential, 3-unit, one-semester classes. Six total units.

The historical development and nature of noncontractual civil law, which allocates the economic burden of various injuries. A study of the principles of liability for harm.

Criminal Law

One-semester 3-unit class.

Topics include substantive criminal law and elements of criminal responsibility; law of crimes against persons; property; and habitation; the theory of criminal responsibility, parties and defenses to crimes.

Constitutional Law

Two sequential, 3-unit, one-semester classes. Six total units.

A study of the United States Constitution with an emphasis on the theory and practice of judicial interpretation and review. Topics include the separation of federal powers, the relation of the federal government to the states and specific government powers (tax, treaty, war, and commercial). The course also covers limitations placed on the exercise of governmental power, emphasizing the Bill of Rights, due process and equal protection clauses.

Required Courses

Legal Writing I

Two sequential, 1-unit, one-semester classes. Two total units.

Students learn to read cases and statutes, extract rules and elements, synthesize rules and elements, analyze legal problems in IRAC format, and write *objective* legal analysis in a cogent style using proper prescriptive grammar and punctuation.

Legal Research

2-unit, one semester class

A class to familiarize students with the basic foundations of legal research. Assignments include researching problems in the law library and researching and writing office memoranda, opinion letters and other documents. A survey of CALR tools, including online resources for legal and public records research is included.

Core Mediation Training

2-unit, one-semester class

This intensive 10-week, 32-hour Mediation Certification Training will teach you how to help others work through their conflicts. This training meets the requirements of the California Dispute Resolution Programs Act for mediators. The communication and problem-solving skills taught in this course are applicable in a wide range of situations including work, personal and community life. The course has been adapted to a virtual format.

MLS Thesis

2-unit, one semester class

A Capstone Thesis is an original paper similar to a law review article, which is 5,000 to 7,000 words in length, not counting the bibliography. It constitutes the students' final product, demonstrating their legal knowledge and their research, analysis, issue-spotting, and writing skills. This course requires in-depth research and a significant amount of work on the part of the student. Thesis topics must be approved by the professor. Writing the Capstone Thesis is the crowning achievement of the MLS program.


Learning Outcomes
