Here are some **examples of basic bequest language** to assist you and your advisors in planning.

Bequest of a Specific Dollar Amount

"I give, devise and bequeath _____ and No/100 dollars (\$Dollars) to Monterey College of Law, a nonprofit organization located at 100 Colonel Durham Street, Seaside, CA, 93955, Federal Tax ID #94-2202421, for Monterey College of Law's (or name the specific College) general use and purpose.

Percentage Bequest

"I give, devise and bequeath ____ percent (____%) of my total estate, determined as of the date of my death, to Monterey College of Law, a nonprofit organization located at 100 Colonel Durham Street, Seaside, CA, 93955, Federal Tax ID #94-2202421, for Monterey College of Law's (or name the specific College) general use and purpose.

Residual Bequest

"I give, devise and bequeath all or a percentage of the rest, residue and remainder of my estate to Monterey College of Law, a nonprofit organization located at 100 Colonel Durham Street, Seaside, CA, 93955, Federal Tax ID #94-2202421, for Monterey College of Law's (or name the specific College) general use and purpose.

Contingent Bequest

If (primary beneficiary) does not survive me, then I hereby give, devise and bequeath to Monterey College of Law, a nonprofit organization located at 100 Colonel Durham Street, Seaside, CA 93955, Federal Tax ID #94-2202421, (description of asset) for Monterey College of Law's (or name the specific College) general use and purpose.

If your gift is one of real estate or personal property, the wording would be changed accordingly. If you are setting up an endowed scholarship, the specifics of how the fund is to be administered and the award criteria would be documented in a Fund agreement we would customize for you. And there may be other ways you might fund the scholarship through your estate, for example by naming Monterey College of Law, San Luis Obispo College of Law, Kern County College of Law, or Empire College of Law, as the beneficiary of a trust or retirement fund.

Restricted Bequests

If you are considering a bequest but would like to ensure that your bequest will be used for a specific purpose, please let us know. We would be happy to work with you and your attorney or estate planning advisor to help you identify ways to give and meet your charitable objectives, including how to craft language to accomplish your goals.

If you are making a restricted bequest, we recommend that you include the following provision to give Monterey College of Law, San Luis Obispo College of Law, Kern County College of Law, or Empire College of Law flexibility should it no longer be possible for us to use your gift as you originally intended:

If, in the judgment of the Board of Trustees of Monterey College of Law, it shall become impossible for Monterey College of Law to use this bequest to accomplish the specific purposes of this bequest, Monterey College of Law may use the income and principal of this gift for such purpose or purposes as the Board determines is most closely related to the restricted purpose of my bequest.
